# **Inventors and Inventions**



Alexander Graham Bell: The invention of the telephone

W/C: 20th April 2020

Alexander Graham Bell changed the way we communicate with one another. He was an inventor which means he made something brand new that had never been done before! He created the telephone so that people could hear another person talking who was far away from them. He had to work very hard to understand how we make sounds and how sound moves.

Subject: Computing

Activity Outcome: Typing a short sentence on Microsoft Word. What message would you send to all of the kind Doctors and Nurses in the hospitals? Can you save your message in your documents folder?

Explain:

Did you know... If you were alive 150 years ago there were no telephones or mobile phones at all!

Did you know... People could only send a very short sentence by writing in a special code. It was sent through a wire! This was called a telegram.

Did you know... You had to pay more money if you wrote more words in your message!

Use the telegram template to help you to write your message and look at the example telegram that I have written.

Subject: History

Activity Outcome: Explaining why Alexander Graham Bell created the telephone. You could either:

- 1. <u>Draw a picture of the main 4 parts of Alexander Graham</u> <u>Bell's life.</u> For example:
- When he was a child listening to the piano.
- When he was an adult teaching people who were deaf to speak.
- When he tried to find out how we make sounds.
- When he invented the telephone using wire.
- 2. <u>Use role-play to act out Alexander Graham Bell's life from a child to an inventor.</u>

Explain:

Did you know... Alexander Graham Bell was interested in sounds when he was a child because he listened to his Dad teaching deaf people how to speak.

Subject: Design and Technology

Activity Outcome: Making a string telephone. Evaluate how well the telephone works to communicate sounds.

Explain:

Did you know... When we make a sound it creates vibrations. These are lots of small movements back and forth.

Did you know... We hear a sound because the vibrations travel into our ears.

Did you know... Inventors have to keep evaluating their work. This means they keep finding what works well and how it can be made even better.

Subject: Music

Activity Outcome: Use your voice expressively to sing a song. Think about when to take a breath. Remember to sit up straight so the sound of your singing is clear. Think about when to sing louder and quieter in the song.

Explain:

The words in the song 'Lean on Me' reminds us to help each other and to be caring in our actions. This is so important at the moment so that we can stay safe and encourage each other.

## How to make a string telephone

#### You will need:

2 paper cups

A sharp pencil to help poke holes (ask an adult to help you with this part)


#### Method:

- Cut a long piece of string.
- 1) 2) Poke a small hole in the bottom of each cup (ask an adult to help you with this part).
- 3) Thread the string through each cup and tie knots at each end to stop it pulling through the cup.
- 4) Move into position with you and a friend holding the cups at a distance that makes the string tight (making sure the string isn't touching anything else).
  One person talks into the cup while the other puts the cup to their ear and listens,
- 5) can you hear each other?
