Europe is one of the world's continents. Around 10% of the world's population lives in Europe.

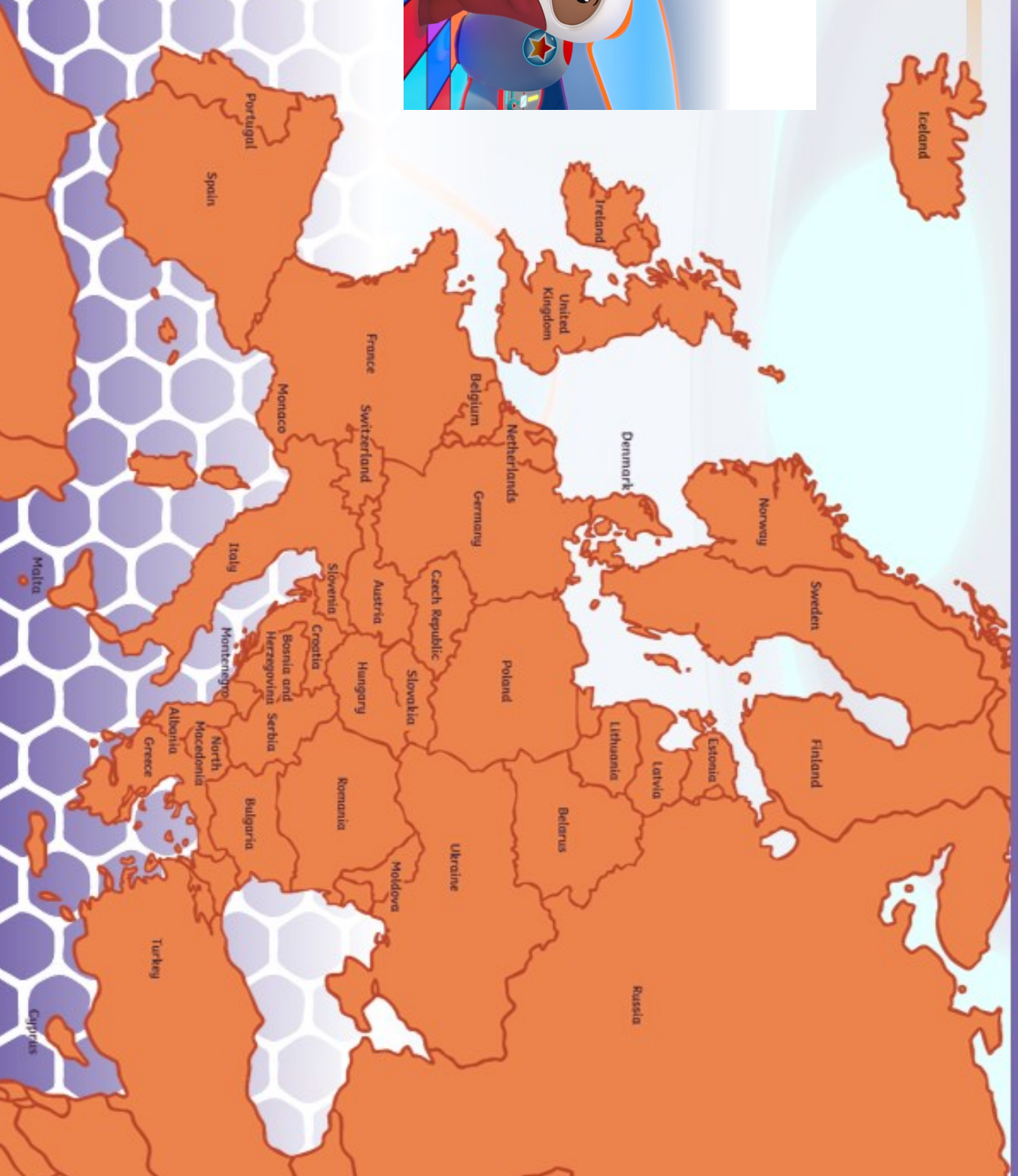
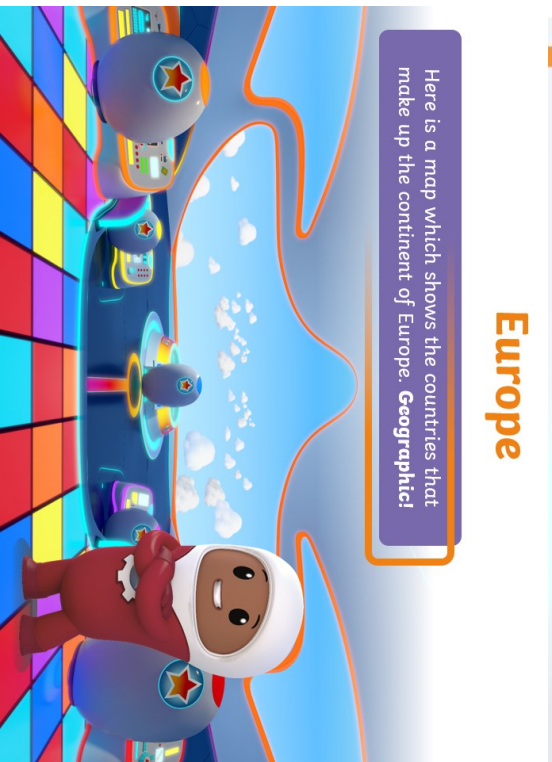

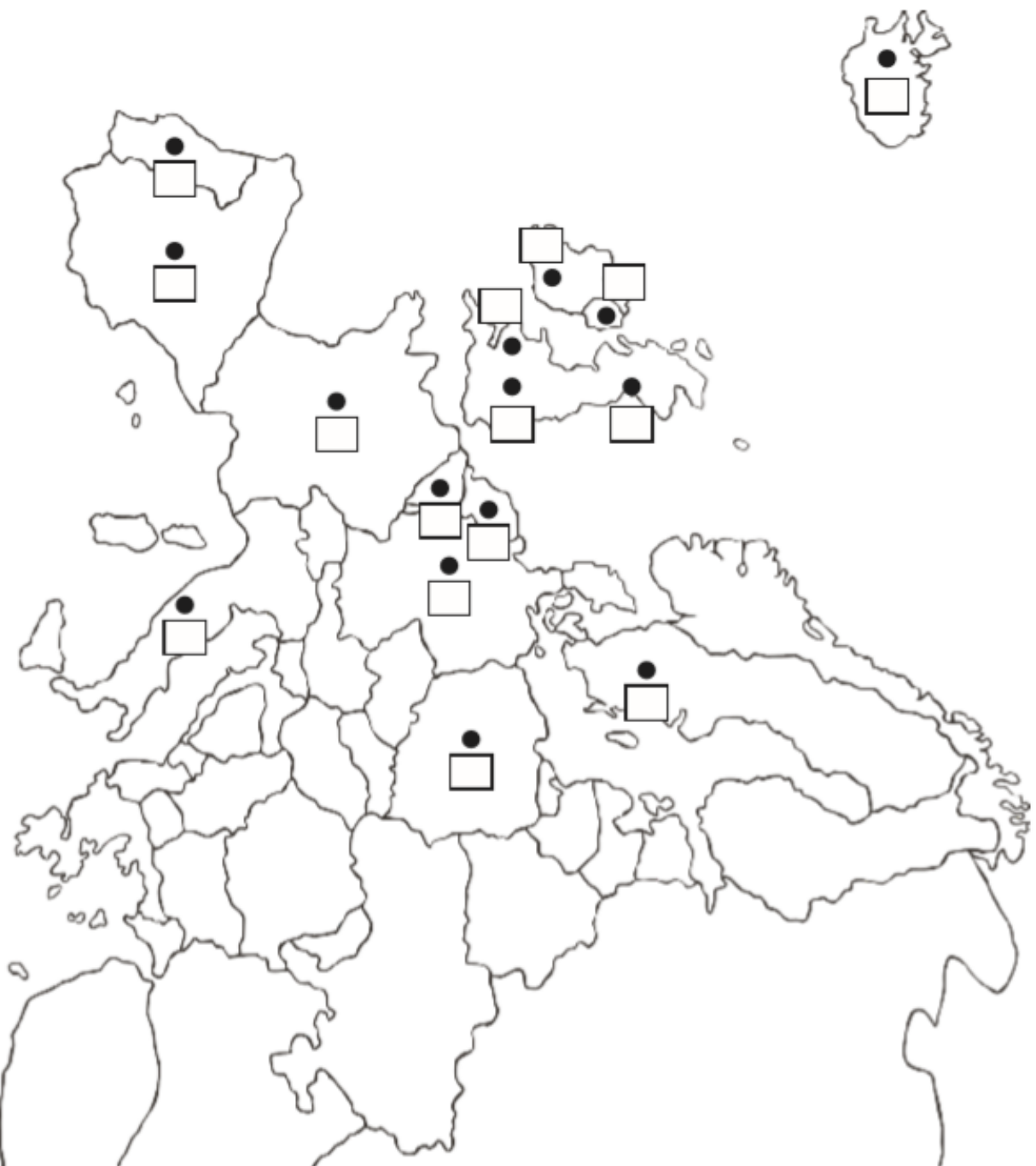

What Is a Landmark?

The Go Jetters love visiting landmarks.
Do you know what a landmark is?

A landmark is something that stands out in an area. It could be a building, a bridge, a lake or river, a sculpture or something else. These places might be special because they are big, nice to look at or really old.

A landmark makes a place recognisable. This means you could look at a picture of a landmark and know straight away where it is.



Brandenburg Gate

The Brandenburg Gate is in the capital city of Germany, **Berlin**. A capital city is where the government of a country meet to decide how a country should be run. It was built over 200 years ago. On the top of the gate is a statue called the quadriga.



Eiffel Tower

This is the Eiffel Tower in Paris, which is the capital of France.



The Guggenheim Museum

The Guggenheim museum is in Bilbao, Spain. It is an art museum and the building itself is thought by many to be a piece of art. There are other Guggenheim museums in places across the world, including in **Italy** and the **USA**.



Mount Etna

Mount Etna is a famous location on an Italian island.



The Matterhorn

The Matterhorn is a mountain in a group of mountains called the Alps. The Matterhorn is in between the countries of Italy and Switzerland. It is 4,478 metres tall – **that's the height of over 1,000 double decker buses sitting on top of each other!**



The Acropolis

The Acropolis is in Athens, the capital city of Greece. It is a hill overlooking the city and is full of buildings, temples and statues that the Ancient Greeks built thousands of years ago. One of the most famous sights is the Parthenon which you can see in this photo.



Plitvice Lakes National Park

Plitvice Lakes National Park is in the country of Croatia. Many countries have national parks. They are special places that are carefully looked after to protect nature. Plitvice Lakes National Park is a group of 16 lakes connected by waterfalls and is home to lots of wildlife including deer, bears, wolves and boars.
