We have made some necessary changes to our curriculum so that children are able to catch up where needed, whilst still enjoying a broad, balanced, fun and exciting curriculum. So What? and Big Idea

All of Featherstone's topics / units are organised into exciting, stimulating and relevant outcomes that get our children enthused about their learning. The children will work towards a 'So What?' where they actively use the learning to solve a problem, invent something, make a change, do something useful or improve a situation. Or, they might work towards a 'Big Idea,' where they learn fundamental life skills and thinking skills. Subjects like English, History, Geography, Art, Geography and Music will be organised in fun and interesting ways. Ask your child what their current 'So What?' or 'Big Idea' is and what it is all about!

- ⇒ **Reception:** I will be 5, so what?
- ⇒ **Year 1:** Lola won't eat healthy food, so what?
- ⇒ **Year 2:** Big Idea: Every story has two sides.
- ⇒ Year 3: Big Idea: Are people healthier now compared to thousands of years ago?
- ⇒ Year 4: No one is too small to make a difference – so what?
- ⇒ **Year 5:** This is who I am So what?
- ⇒ Year 6: Big Idea: Let your light shine so brightly that others can see their way out of the dark

Enrichment

Children at Featherstone love their Friday enrichment, which is now entering its fourth year here at Featherstone! However, COVID-19 meant that last year, children could not complete their Spring or Summer Enrichment clubs. Because of current government requirements of year groups not mixing with each other, all children facing the front of the classroom, as well as the 1m+ social distancing, Enrichment, for now, can't take place.

When we are able to get Enrichment back up and running, we will let you know.
